### General Regulations

Please read the following conditions of entry carefully before completing your entry form.

Local exhibitors means that the exhibitor must reside within the Wollondilly Local Government Area.

No late entries will be accepted. Please assist by staging your exhibits early on the appropriate day and providing a separate entry form for each section.

Judges' and Chief Stewards' decisions are final.

Identification will be attached to each exhibit by stewards.

All entries must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor and small enough to be handled by one person.

Any entry may be disqualified at the discretion of the Chief Pavilion Steward.

### RESPONSIBILITY

Damage through exhibits: The Society will not be responsible for any accidents that may be caused through or by any exhibit, and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the society blameless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such accident.

Damage to exhibits: The society will not under any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss or misdelivery of exhibits at the society's show or for any damage thereto.

Appeals: All appeals must be lodged with the Secretary, or left at the office of the Secretary, addressed to her, by the close of the show. Such protests, in writing, are to be accompanied by \$20 + gst, which may be forfeited if the protest is considered frivolous.

Fees: A fee of \$1.00 per entry applies for each section unless otherwise stated. Junior Section (aged under 16 years) 50 cents per entry.

Prizes: Unless otherwise specified, prize money is 1st \$3.00, 2nd \$1.50. Ribbons, trophies and prizes as specified. No prize money for juniors unless specified, first and second certificates. Sponsored prizes are correct at the time of printing and may be substituted by a prize of similar value.

A minimum of three entries per class or no cash prizes except where stated) will be awarded. Prize cards will be awarded in all sections.

Pavilion opening times: The Pavilion will open at approximately 10am Saturday and close at 8pm. The pavilion will re-open at 9am on Sunday and close at 3pm.

Class 36 Rich Fruit Cake Competition

Sponsored by the Agricultural Societies Council of NSW. This recipe is compulsory for all entrants. The cake must be uncut.

Winners at country shows will each receive a cash prize of \$25 and will be required to bake a second "Rich Fruit Cake" in order to compete in a Group Final to be conducted by each of the fourteen Groups of the Agricultural Societies Council of NSW. The winner from Picton will go onto the Group Final which will be judged on a date to be advised in November 2022. Exhibitors will be able to bring their cakes and wait to take them home or delegates can bring the cake.

The winners at Group level will each receive a cash prize of \$50 and are required to bake a third "Rich Fruit Cake" for the final judging at the Royal Easter Show where the winner will receive a cash prize of \$100.00.

Note: In any year an individual competitor may participate in only one Group Final representing a Show society and consequently, may represent only one Group in the subsequent State Final.

Compulsory Recipe

Here's what you need:

250g (8 oz) sultanas  
250g (8 oz) chopped raisins  
250g (8 oz) currants  
125g (4 oz) chopped, mixed peel  
90g (3 oz) chopped red glazed cherries  
90g (3 oz) chopped blanched almonds  
½ cup sherry or brandy  
250g (8 oz) plain flour  
60g (2 oz) self-raising flour  
¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg  
½ teaspoon ground ginger  
½ teaspoon ground cloves  
250g (8 oz) butter  
250g (8 oz) soft brown sugar  
½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind  
½ teaspoon almond essence  
½ teaspoon vanilla essence  
4 large eggs.

Here's what you do:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin no larger than 20cm (8") and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½-4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4-6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

2. Framed and board mounted exhibits not permitted.
3. Must be machine pieced and machine quilted.
4. Minimal Embellishments. Small amount only not to overpower patchwork.
5. Each exhibit entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
6. An exhibit having won at a Show will compete at a Group Final.
7. An exhibitor may represent only one local show at the Group Final.
8. If, for any reason, a winner is unable to compete at Group level then the second place getter is eligible to compete.
9. All work to have been completed in the last eighteen (18) months prior to its entry at a local show.
10. An exhibit that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.
11. If this class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward in consultation with the appropriate Pavilion Section Judges, may select a suitable quilt and, with the exhibitor's permission, enter them in the Group judging as an exhibit representing the particular Society concerned.
12. Group Final location and date is to be determined by the Group. It is the responsibility of either the exhibitor or the Show Society to ensure the quilt is delivered on Judging Day and collected in an appropriate time frame after the competition
