General Regulations

Please review the following entry conditions carefully before completing your entry form:

- Local Exhibitors: Exhibitors must reside within the Wollondilly Local Government Area.
- **Entry Deadline**: Late entries will not be accepted. Please ensure your exhibits are staged early on the designated day and submit a separate entry form for each section.
- Judging: The decisions of the Judges and Chief Stewards are final.
- Identification: Stewards will attach identification to each exhibit.
- **Exhibit Requirements**: All entries must be the genuine work of the exhibitor and small enough to be handled by one person.
- **Disqualification**: The Chief Pavilion Steward reserves the right to disqualify any entry at their discretion.

Responsibility

- Damage through Exhibits: The Society is not responsible for any accidents caused by exhibits. Each exhibitor agrees to hold the Society blameless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such accidents.
- **Damage to Exhibits**: The Society will not be liable for any loss, misdelivery, or damage to exhibits at the show.
- Appeals: Appeals must be submitted in writing to the Secretary by the end of the show, accompanied by a \$20 + GST fee, which may be forfeited if the appeal is deemed frivolous.
- **Fees**: The entry fee is \$1.00 per entry for each section, unless otherwise stated. For the Junior Section (under 16 years), the fee is 50 cents per entry.
- Prizes: Unless specified otherwise, prize money is \$3.00 for 1st place and \$1.50 for 2nd place. Ribbons, trophies, and other prizes will be awarded as specified. Junior prizes, unless otherwise stated, include first and second certificates only. Sponsored prizes are accurate at the time of printing and may be substituted with a prize of similar value. A minimum of three entries per class is required for cash prizes, except where otherwise stated. Prize cards will be awarded in all sections.
- Pavilion Opening Times: The Pavilion will open at approximately 10:00 AM on Saturday and close at 8:00 PM. It will re-open at 9:00 AM on Sunday and close at 2:00 PM.
- Collection of Entries & Prizes: Prize money and entries should be collected between 4:00 PM and 6:00 PM on Sunday. Perishable items not collected will be disposed of.

This recipe is compulsory for all entrants. The cake must be uncut.

Prizes and Competition Details:

 Picton Show Winners: Each will receive a cash prize of \$25 and will be required to bake a second "Rich Fruit Cake" to compete in a Group Final organised by the Agricultural Societies Council of NSW's fourteen groups. The Picton winner will advance to the Group Final.

Group Final:

• Date: Saturday, 2nd November, 2024

• Location: Robertson

Exhibitors can either bring their cakes to the event or arrange for a delegate to bring them.

• **Group Level Winners:** Each will receive a cash prize of \$50 and must bake a third "Rich Fruit Cake" for the final judging at the Royal Easter Show, where the winner will receive a cash prize of \$100.

Note: An individual competitor may participate in only one Group Final per year and, consequently, may represent only one Group in the subsequent State Final.

Compulsory Recipe for All Entrants

Ingredients:

- 250g sultanas
- 250g chopped raisins
- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- 250g plain flour
- 60g self-raising flour
- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence or finely grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

Recommended Method:

- 1. Mix together all the fruits and nuts, then sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, preferably overnight.
- 2. Sift together the plain flour, self-raising flour, and spices.
- 3. Cream the butter and sugar with the essences.
- 4. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Then, alternately add the fruit mixture and flour mixture, mixing thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
- 5. Place the mixture into a prepared square tin (20cm x 20cm or 8" x 8") and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 ½ 4 hours.
- 6. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity, it is suggested to snip the raisins into 2 or 3 pieces, the cherries into 4-6 pieces, and the almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

- 1. **Size:** The exhibit must fit within a square of 1m x 1m maximum size.
- 2. **Item:** Acceptable items include patchwork and quilting projects such as bags, table runners, cushion covers, and quilts.
- 3. Framing: Framed and board-mounted exhibits are not permitted.
- 4. **Construction:** Exhibits must be either hand and/or machine pieced and quilted.
- 5. **Embellishments:** Use minimal embellishments. Small amounts only, ensuring they do not overpower the patchwork.
- 6. **Originality:** Each exhibit must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- 7. **Group Final:** An exhibit that has won at a Show will compete at a Group Final.
- 8. **Eligibility:** An exhibit may only represent one Society at the Group level.
- 9. **Substitute Competitor:** If a winner cannot compete at the Group level, the second-place entrant is eligible to compete.
- 10.**Completion Time:** All work must have been completed in the last twelve (12) months prior to entry at a local show.

- 11. **Previous Competition:** Exhibits that have previously competed at the Group level are not eligible to compete again.
- 12.**No Entries:** If this class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward, in consultation with the Pavilion Section Judges, may select a suitable quilted patchwork to represent the Society, with the exhibitor's permission.

Conditions:

1. Definitions:

- o Garment: An item that can be worn (e.g., dress, jacket, scarf, hat).
- **Article:** A utility item not worn but used in the home (e.g., blanket), with an outfit (e.g., bag), for amusement (e.g., toy), or as a decoration (e.g., picture).

- Three Different Types: The 3 items in an entry must differ in construction technique and/or purpose. Examples:
 - A knitted jumper, blanket, and tea cosy.
 - A knitted tea cosy, crocheted tea cosy, and felted tea cosy.
 - A knitted jumper, a knitted blanket, and a crocheted blanket.
- 2. **Wool Content:** All articles/garments must contain a minimum of 80% sheep wool, excluding lining.
- 3. **Craftsmanship:** Articles/garments may be knitted, crocheted, sewn, felted, etc., and must be hand-crafted. Machine use is permitted.
- 4. **Sample Requirement:** A sample of the yarn, fabric, or fibre with a label must be attached to each item. If a label is not available (e.g., for hand-spun or felted items), a handwritten label with relevant details and a sample will suffice.
- 5. Eligibility: Exhibits may consist of individual, group, or organisational work.
- 6. **Completion Timeline:** All three items must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.

Group 5 Final Wool Articles and/or Garments:

450g (3 cups) plain flour

60g (½ cup) icing sugar

½ teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons cream of tartar

1 tablespoon bicarbonate of soda (baking soda)

55g butter

1 beaten egg

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 220°C (425°F). Lightly flour a baking tray.
- 2. Sift 450g (3 cups) plain flour into a bowl with 60g (½ cup) icing sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons cream of tartar, and 1 tablespoon bicarbonate of soda. Sift the dry ingredients together twice more.
- 3. Rub 55g butter into the sifted dry ingredients until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.
- 4. Stir in 1 beaten egg and 375ml (1½ cups) milk. Handle the mixture as lightly as possible and pat it into shape with your hands.
- 5. Cut the dough into scone shapes and place them on the prepared baking tray. Brush the tops with a little milk.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven for about 12-15 minutes, or until the scones are a rich golden brown.

Ingredients:

450g (3 cups) plain flour

350g (1½ cups) caster sugar

225g butter

Vanilla essence (to taste)

Grated zest of 1 lemon

3 eggs, well beaten

1 teaspoon baking powder

Instructions:

- 1. In a bowl, combine 450g (3 cups) plain flour and 350g (1½ cups) caster sugar. Rub in 225g butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.
- 2. Flavour with vanilla essence and the grated zest of 1 lemon. Add 3 well-beaten eggs, stirring well to combine. The mixture should form a firm dough. Cover the dough and let it rest in a cool place for a while.

Junior Section

- 3. When ready to use, roll out the dough and sprinkle 1 teaspoon baking powder over it. Knead the dough gently, fold it over, and roll it out again.
- 4. Cut the dough into shapes, place them on a greased baking tray, and bake in a 200°C (400°F) oven until golden.
- 5. Once baked, brush with whipped egg whites and decorate as desired.
